Message From the President

Hello Loon Lake Friends and Happy Spring!

This is my first communication as President of the board and I'm excited for the future of our board and our Lake. John Nick, our longtime President has stepped down after 6 years and will continue to serve on the board managing our invasives remediation program. I will work hard to meet his high standard – thank you for your continued service, John!

Many of you will receive this newsletter delivered to your home in a package with important information about the LLPDA and the lake. Gail Danforth has taken over publishing the annual newsletter from our former Vice President Rich McCrum. Gail has created a package starting last year that we deliver to all the homes in the area. Ken Wade manages our Block Captain program that recruits volunteers to deliver the package. (Rich has also stepped down from the board officer position of Vice President and remains on the board to manage our lake plotting program for invasives management. Thank you for your hard work, Rich!)

We have three new volunteers on the board – Lisa Deering, Sue Chambers and Andrea McDonough. Lisa will serve as our board secretary to keep LLPDA minutes and membership records. Andrea and Sue will serve on our board and work to promote LLPDA programs. Thank you and welcome Lisa, Sue and Andrea!

The Loon Lake Park District Association is an all-volunteer organization that acts as “stewards of the lake”. Over the last dozen years or so, one major focus of that stewardship is protecting our lake from invasive species that threaten the long-term health of our lake and its aquatic life. Loon Lake has Eurasian Milfoil, Curly Leaf Pondweed and Water Chestnuts. We have seen little evidence in recent years of water chestnuts and curly leaf pondweed, but Eurasian Milfoil is here to stay. Eurasian milfoil forms thick mats in shallow areas of a lake, quickly growing and spreading to block sunlight, killing off native aquatic plants that fish and other underwater species rely on for food and shelter. Working with contractors like Dominic Jude of Aqualogic, we have kept the milfoil to a manageable level. This is an ongoing effort, but we are proud of the progress we have made to protect our lake.

Many invasives come in on boats that are launched in our lake that have visited other lakes with invasive species. For the last few years, the LLPDA has managed the boat wash station at the public launch. Our efforts to identify and clean invasives from boats entering our lake has significantly reduced new invasives entering our lake. Thank you to everyone for supporting the boat wash and inspection station. The boat launch fee helps to pay for this service to make it as self-supporting as possible.

Another focus for the LLPDA is boating safety and training. You will see our scheduled July class for the New York State boating safety class, we offer this in July on the 5th and 6th. In the past, New York state required the boating safety class only for anyone operating a personal watercraft (PWC). This requirement has been updated to anyone operating a motorized boat for the 2025 boating season. Come and join us for this fun and informative class.

We are truly grateful for the support you have shown the LLPDA. We have averaged over 300 paid members for the past several years and welcome new members every year. Remember to join us for our public meeting the morning of July 9th at the Chestertown Town Hall. We present our work publicly to our members and discuss open initiatives and issues. Would love to see you there!

Loon Lake Eurasian Milfoil

Loon Lake is a beautiful small lake in the Southern Adirondacks with a problem. Like many lakes we are **infected** with Eurasian Water Milfoil (EWM). Most of you know that we have been battling this infestation with manpower and funds through Warren County and the Town of Chester for years. In 2017 Loon Lake

spent \$90,000 for invasive mitigation and have been able to lower our costs each year while improving the remediation results until 2021. In 2020 and 2021 we spent \$59,150 and in 2022 we spent \$59,962.50 for Invasive Remediation. In 2022, EWM abundance increased from both 2020 and 2021 levels, with the distribution

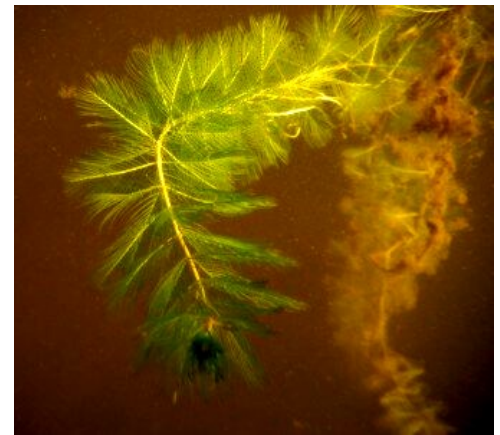
of plants changing. We are losing progress in the **no Milfoil** category as more plants scatter throughout the lake. These results indicate that we are at or below our minimum funding and hand harvesting efforts to maintain the Milfoil at acceptable levels using current harvesting methods.

The provided funds has facilitated the of hiring professionals to hand harvest and remediate/eliminate the EWM. In addition, we use our volunteers, the Invasive Remediation Evaluation Teams (IRETS) to evaluate the remediation progress each year. Our teams survey the 255 locations on Loon Lake that were created to assess the location and density of Eurasian water milfoil (EWM). These sites have remained constant since 2018.

In 2021 Adirondack Park Invasive Plant Program (APIPP) created a publicly accessible Google Map showing the locations. It can be accessed at: loonlakeassociation.com/invasive-species

Key Points

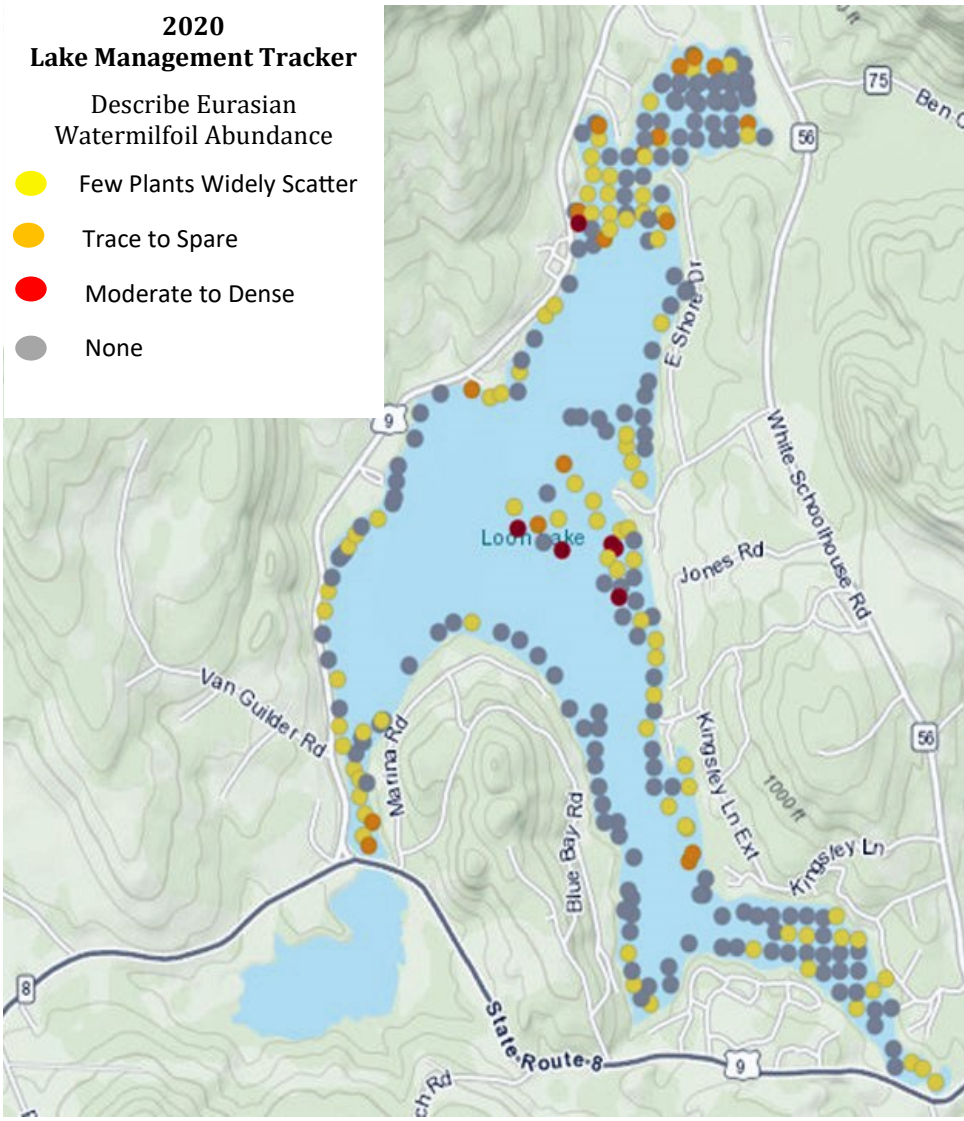
- ◆ EWM is persistently established in Loon Lake.
- ◆ From 2020 to 2022 the locations with EWM has increased 23%. It appears that EWM is in a growth phase at Loon Lake and current management is not able to keep up.
- ◆ Overall, from 2018 to 2022 the locations with EWM has increased by 5%. In years that the environmental conditions are not conducive for EWM growth and proper management occurs, progress can be made. But in years when the environmental conditions are favorable for EWM or not enough management is done that progress is lost.
- ◆ In light of this new data it would be good to revisit EWM management goals and strategies. APIPP could facilitate some meetings to help the local community create an adaptive management plan to guide work for the next several years.
- ◆ Volunteers are key to monitoring the lake! It is because of their hard work and dedication that we have quality data that allows the evaluation and assessment of the current condition of EWM in the lake.



In the past a relatively small number of volunteers surveyed all 255 points. This method increased the subjective consistency of the evaluation, but was long and laborious, Last year we expanded the Invasive Remediation Evaluation Teams (IRETS) program and divided the lake into sections, trained more volunteers and spread the workload. This made the process much faster and it takes each group only about one morning or afternoon to complete their surveys.

The surveys take place late September or early October and will continue in 2023. I will provide refresher training and train new volunteers in early September. I thank all out volunteer IRETS for their outstanding work this past year.

LLPDA Partnership with the Adirondack Center for Loon



Every year on the third Saturday in July, the Adirondack Center for Loon Conservation (ACLC) recruits volunteers from lakes across the Adirondacks to participate in the NY Annual Loon Census. From 8:00 AM to 9:00 AM, volunteers head out to their assigned lake with a map in hand to record the number of Adult Loons and their Chicks as well as their exact location on the Lake. This summer will mark the LLPDA's sixth year of taking part in this event. Last summer, Loon Lake was the summer home to three Adult Loons. Unfortunately, no Chicks.

Fishing lines get caught on the bottom of our lake on things other than fish. Please, simply pull up as much of the line as you possibly can before cutting it. If you are out on the lake, and find fishing line along the shoreline, under water or stuck in trees, logs, or other places, ***please pick it up and recycle it in one of Loon Lake's fishing line recycling containers. Please feel free to deposit any lead tackle you may have, we guarantee that it will be disposed of properly.***

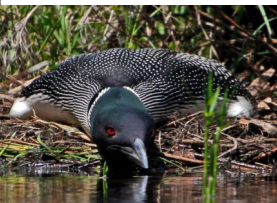

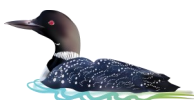

Brianna's Law five year phase-in requirement process to get all boaters certified to operate a motorized watercraft is now in year three. Under this law, new age groups are gradually added to those required to carry a boater card.

If you were born:

- **On or after January 1, 1993** - must complete a safety course beginning in 2020
- **On or after January 1, 1988** - must complete a safety course beginning in 2022
- **On or after January 1, 1983** - must complete a safety course beginning in 2023
- **On or after January 1, 1978** - must complete a safety course beginning in 2024
- **Prior to 1978** - must complete a safety course beginning in 2025

Dear Loon Lake Park District Residents,

We look forward to another great year in the area. All services for the boat wash decontamination station and boat launch are lined up and are fully funded, as is the contract for Eurasian milfoil mitigation. We continue to watch for funding notices for the dam rehabilitation project (we have the permits and designs all set). We will have lifeguards to keep the beach operating but are always looking for more help – so please let us know if you or anyone else would be interested. We will also have a Lake Safety Officer on patrol through the season.

We continue to have openings of new businesses and new owners throughout the Town, including a new childcare center based in the Municipal Center. A new trail will be added to the Chester Challenge trails and plans are in the works for more pickleball courts. We continue to focus on family-centered activities and projects that appeal to year-round and seasonal residents alike.

The Town Board has gone through an intensive process regarding Short Term Rental registration. We recognize the value it provides many property owners in the area and we are aware of issues that come with the new rental format. Our approach has been conservative and the resulting requirements are less than that required for any new business in Town. The Town Board has scheduled a Public Hearing on the Short Term Rental Local Law for May 30th.

We appreciate the partnership with the Loon Lake Park District Association and their efforts to maintain and improve the water quality of the Lake. From their educational efforts, to water annual sampling and monitoring plant growth, to managing the boat wash station, the LLPDA helps achieve what would otherwise be out of reach. Not to mention all the fun activities they sponsor! It is the cooperative and volunteer spirit like this that makes our Town such a great place to live, work, and play.

The Town of Chester Will be Conducting a Town-Wide Assessment Update of Each and Every Parcel Within the Town Borders for the Year 2024

The real property tax collected by local taxing authorities is distributed on an “ad varem” basis. This simply means that each property owner pays their Fair Share of the property tax burden in proportion to the value of the real property they own. To ensure fairness, property values must be reviewed on a regular basis.

The last town-wide assessment update was completed in 2008...15 years ago. New construction, subdivision and economic changes were incorporated on each of the subsequent year’s assessment rolls, based on the standards established in 2008. Changes in the economy require that we analyze all property using current acceptable statistical applications to ensure all properties remain *equitable*.

The Town of Chester will be conducting this update with the assistance of Maxwell Appraisal Service, a professional valuation firm familiar with the area. Staff members of Maxwell Appraisal Service, aided by the Town Assessor’s office will be completing the tasks necessary for this update.

All properties will be visited and new photos will be taken. We would like to get a photo of both the front and back of the structures on the property. We do our absolute best to respect everyone’s privacy and property. Feel free to ask for identification when opening your door for anyone claiming to be from this office or Maxwell Appraisal.

This update began in March 2023. We intend to complete the on-site inspections by the end of 2023. Field review of parcels will run through the late fall and winter months before setting the new assessments. Unfortunately we will not be able to inform property owners in advance when their parcel will be visited. Weather, schedules and other factors / variables make it impossible to predict specific dates and times when a parcel will be visited.



In early March 2024, each property owner will receive a “disclosure notice” with the preliminary assessment and a relative tax estimate. This estimate assumes all exemptions in effect for the 2023 assessment roll will remain valid and budgets for fiscal year 2023 / 2024 are identical.

Assessments are not the only factor in the calculation of a tax bill. Unfortunately, this office has no way of foreseeing any budget increases or changes after the revaluation is completed. Some assessments will go up, some will go down and some will remain around the same. If your assessment goes up, that does not necessarily mean that your taxes will increase. Your preliminary assessment notice will give you an approximation of your projected taxes based on the new assessment utilizing the most recent tax rates.

The assessment will reflect 100% of market value “as of” July 1, 2023. The assessment of your property should be approximately the amount you would expect to sell it for on the open market, under normal circumstances, between an educated, willing buyer and seller, where it is assumed that there are no unusual conditions or circumstances attached to the sale.

Informal hearings will be held at stated times by appointment during March 2024. During this time, you will have the opportunity to review the information utilized in preparing your assessed value and discuss the assessment with Maxwell Appraisal Services. Protecting Loon Lake & Your Investment at the Same Time

There are a number of things you can do to protect your lake. When looking to preserve your waterfront life, the list is simple: filter and/or infiltrate your properties stormwater runoff, maintain your septic system and if you're a big fan of well fertilized manicured grassy spaces, get a golf membership. Lets take each of these suggestions in order.

Stormwater runoff: the rain and snowmelt from your impervious surfaces should enter the lake as ground water if possible or at the very least, filtered. The use of gutters, rain barrels and rain gardens will go a long way to keeping your lake free of additional nutrients that can lead to filamentous algae blooms, aquatic plant growth and Harmful Algae Blooms (HAB's). Break up straight lines from the house to the lake, use a curved path to the lake, use permeable materials, and save trees on your property, they take up large amounts of nutrients and water. Direct stormwater to flower/rain gardens and plant shrubs along your shoreline. Who doesn't like blueberries, or flowering dogwoods or any number of native shrubs that can be trimmed to height you can live with while their deep root systems take up nutrients and stabilize your shoreline from ice damage and wave erosion.

Septic Systems: maintenance is the key, pump out regularly (3-5 years), have the system inspected every 5 years and don't put any harsh chemicals into your system.

The Perfect Lawn: the amount of chemicals and fertilizer needed to maintain the dream lawn are severely impacting water quality in your lake. When it comes to maintaining lawn, keep it long (4-6 inches) and use a mulching mower instead of adding fertilizer; the next time you're playing golf, look at the ponds, would you jump in those? Speaking of adding chemicals to the water, if you have a boat, clean it on shore prior to launching for the summer. Maintain your motor to keep oil, gas and coolants out of the lake. If you have to clean the hull during the season there are a number of lake safe products to use.

Here on Loon Lake, the scenes change every day, every month, every season and you want to be here to see it all. Whether you were born to it or have come later in life, everyone who owns lake front properties are here for the same reason, to enjoy the entire experience and preserve it for the next generation. There is a shared responsibility for all who live on the lake to protect that which you love so much.

July 30st - Family Hike ~ Palmer Pond - 2 miles

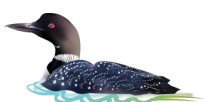
